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n September 11, 2014, the Southern University Ag Center welcomed students, faculty and staff from schools in Acadia, Allen, Avoyelles, Evangeline, Lafayette, Pointe Coupee, St. Landry, St. Martin and Vermillion Parishes to its 14th Back-to-School Summit for 8th graders at the Blackham Coliseum in Lafayette. The event themed "Healthy Actions Produce Positive Youth" had Danna "Dr Truth" Andrus serving Keynote as speaker. Special appearances featured Cadet Cody LeBlanc, ULL Army, for the Presentation of Colors, and speech by Lt. Gen. Russell Honore (Retired), United States Army, in of commemoration 911. Speakers included Byron Starks, Coach and Mentor, and Den Hussev. Motivational Speaker/MC. Shalvric Self provided entertainment. Also prominent were Senator Elbert Guillory, LA State District 24; and Chancellor Leodrey Williams, SU Ag Center, with welcome greetings.

Chancellor, LSU Ag Center, received an award at the 19th Annual Booker T. Washington Economic Summit at Tuskegee University, AL. The 2014 summit themed "Revitalizing Small Towns and Rural Communities through Entrepreneurship and Procurement Opportunities," took place at the Tuskegee University Kellogg Conference Center September 24 -26.

The leadership award was presented to Dr. Eubanks during the Leadership Award and Business Success Story Luncheon on September 26. The Booker T. Washington Economic Summit is a part of the Tuskegee University Cooperative Extension program in Community Resources and Economic Development. This program area primarily focuses on community resources and leadership development, business and entrepreneurial development, individual and family financial management, and job preparedness in rural Alabama.

SU Ag Center to Collaborate on E-Fuel Research with Tanzanian University

Fuels enthusiasts gathered at SU Ag Center for an international conference with Bagamoyo University in Tanzania via skype. On Friday, September 26, members of Green Solar Louisiana, 360 Systems, E-Fuel System Technology and members of University of Bagamoyo held a virtual collaboration planning meeting on the SU Ag Center campus.

The purpose of the meeting was to strategically plan the best approach to introduce the University of Bagamoyo in Tanzania to 100% ethanol-based system while conducting research with Southern University on the full utilization of e-fuels. The long term plan includes establishing a train-thetrainer center in Louisiana for Tanzanians who will return home and train others in the commercial production of ethanol for diverse uses in an environmentally friendly and efficient manner. Private sector entities will lead the research between the two universities.

Louisiana Students visit Nation's Capital for Citizenship Washington Focus

S tudents from two Louisiana parishes visited our Nation's Capital for Citizenship Washington Focus 2014. July 6th -11th, six students from East Baton Rouge and St. Landry parishes attended Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF) in Washington, D.C. Youth were accompanied by two chaperones, Ms. Tara Hollins and Mrs. Tiffany Wilkerson-Franklin. Ms. Hollins is a science teacher at Southern Lab School and Mrs. Wilkerson-Franklin is the Project Coordinator, SU Ag Center.

Students who were selected to attend CWF 2014 were Ronjacoby Bell, Maya Stevenson, Maya Sterling, Dwayne Smith, Jr., John Zacharie, and Anthony Jack. Youth enjoyed lodging at the wellknown 4-H Youth Conference Center in Chevy Chase, MD. Prior to attending CWF, students studied 4 -H lessons on stewardship, leadership, and citizenship. Citizenship

Washington Focus (CWF) is a week-long 4-H citizenship program for youth ages 14-19. CWF provides opportunities for young people to: strengthen communication, leadership and other citizenship skills on a national level; understand the importance of civic and social responsibilities as they relate to the development of better citizens and leaders: and exchange ideas, practice respect and form friendships with other youth from diverse backgrounds. Both being small delegations, Louisiana and Virginia were combined, which reinforced the goal involving diversity.

Students had the opportunity to visit many well-known landmarks around Washington, D.C., which included: The Capitol, Mount Vernon, Arlington National Cemetery, Presidential and War Memorials, Library of Congress, and Smithsonian Museums. One unique experience was that youth had to develop a realistic action plan that may be implemented at their school. The students chose a major on-going issue that many youth across the country are faced with, which is bullying. Citizenship Washington Focus gave youth the opportunity to explore, develop, and refine the civic engagement skills they need to be outstanding leaders in their community, country and world. The workshops, tours, and nightly check in sessions equipped them with the tools they need to return home to share their experience. Students had a full schedule from 6 a.m. to 11 p.m. and for their participation, one student from each group was randomly selected to receive an Apple IPad Mini, provided by Farm Credit.

Mrs. Wilkerson-Franklin said, "the overall experience was one that the youth will tell their children about, as they have never been to our Nation's Capital before this opportunity."

"Their parents were very supportive of this opportunity and for that I am grateful. The expressions on their faces as they enjoyed this experience were memorable for me," said Wilkerson-Franklin.

"Ms. Hollins was a great support system and was great with the youth. I would like to thank Farm Credit for the scholarships, 4-H National Council, and the SU Ag Center Administration for their support in providing this "chance of a lifetime" for our youth in Louisiana!"

SU Ag Center Tests Pre-workout Eating Program at SU Lab School

On September 24, the Kittengizer Pre-Workout Eating Program, a healthy snack alternative for the student athletes that will foster better eating habits before workouts, was launched at Southern University Laboratory School. Dr. Fatemeh Malekian, Food Science/Nutrition, and Mfamara Goita, Research Associate, Southern University Ag Center, led the Taste-Testing Event to ensure food safety and to gather results.

The Taste-Testing Event, sponsored by Trader Joe's, will be a catalyst in creating awareness of healthy eating and hydration before workouts. The goal was to gage the student athletes' preference.

The 98 student athletes had a variety of energy/protein bars ranging from Peanut Butter, Chocolate Chip, Fudge Brownie, Apple Cereal Bar, Granola Crunch. Bananas, a key food choice in providing potassium to help in preventing cramps were also provided.

"The success of the program was due mostly to the coaches and volunteers who supported the program like Coach Brumfield, Ms. Flowers, Parent, students, and the athletes," Malekian said.

The project focused on conceptual designs for the SU Ag Center Challenge Camp and

Dr. Austin Allen of the Robert Reich School of Landscape Architecture and his team worked in conjunction with Southern University Agricultural Research staff to design an area where the citizens of Louisiana can participate in, and learn about the natural benefits the state has to offer.

This federal/state funded project will benefit citizens in respect to wildlife and agriculture in a healthy way for prekindergarteners, youth, adults and seniors.

Orleans Parish Concludes Mini Grant Healthy Gardening Project

Krystal Sugulleh, Youth Development Agent in Orleans Parish led the "Gardening for a Healthy Community" grant which targeted the Gentilly area and Greater St. Stephens Church which are current food deserts in New Orleans. The program provided opportunities to youth and adults from low income areas that have little or no access to fresh produce. Community adults and youth learned basic essential gardening skills. The project goals are to expose 4-H youth members and adults to fresh fruits and vegetables through learning and hands-on experiences; increase community service, citizenship, environmental stewardship, responsibility and community pride through community gardening; raise awareness about the growing rate of obesity

and related health risks; encourage youth to make healthier food choices and increase physical activity by participating in gardening; and introduce healthier lifestyles options for youth and adults in Greater New Orleans and in designated areas.

The Gardening for a Healthy Community Project was utilized as an outlet to provide transferable skills, teach new productive activities, and create healthy living habits in low income, low food access communities. The use of the SU Ag Center Community Garden Curriculum and 4-H curriculums and materials impacted youth and adults as they gained an increased knowledge in nutrition education, citizenship skills, gardening skills, and responsibility through program participation.

The grant which was funded by Southern University Ag Center ended in September after nine months and impacted 30 participants.
