### USDA Deputy Secretary Xochitl Torres Small Visits the SU Ag Center and the SUBR Campus

Xochit Torres Small, United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Deputy Secretary, visited the Southern University Ag Center and Baton Rouge campus on April 1, 2024.

The visit was Torres Small's first stop on her nationwide tour visiting universities and land-grant institutions to speak with students and administrators about the career opportunities in rural development and all that the USDA has to offer.

Dr. Katara Williams presided over the luncheon and greetings were given by Southern University System President-Chancellor Dennis Shields and SU Ag Center Chancellor-Dean Dr. Orlando F. McMeans.

Torres Small spoke to a group of SU Ag Center and Baton Rouge campus faculty and staff along with USDA administrators and congressional representatives.

Immediately following the luncheon, she spent time in a student roundtable with the university's USDA 1890 scholars discussing why they chose to major in agriculture and their career goals.

Torres Small is the first Latina to hold the position of Deputy Secretary of the USDA. She was confirmed by the United States Senate on July 11, 2023.

Before serving in her current position, she served as the USDA Under Secretary for Rural Development where she oversaw loans and grants to provide infrastructure improvements; business development; affordable housing; community facilities; and high-speed internet access in rural, Tribal, and high-poverty areas.

Prior to joining the USDA, Torres Small was a United States Representative for the fifth-largest district in the country. She is the first woman and first person of color to represent New Mexico's second congressional district.

### SU Dietetic Interns Visited the WHO DAT Nation



### Milagro Berhane Speaks on Her Career in Agriculture

Milagro Berhane, or Mila as she is affectionately known, has been employed at the Southern University Agricultural Research and Extension Center (SU Ag Center) for 32 years. The Senior Research Associate and adjunct professor in the College of Agricultural, Human and Environmental Sciences wears many hats and says that her career in agriculture began by accident. In her own words, she explains her love for her work and the field of agriculture.

#### Why did you select a career in Agriculture?

I was hired to be a lab manager for Southern University's College of Agriculture and my supervisor was working in Sustainable Agriculture. I started helping and that made me switch completely to agriculture. That happened more than 30 years ago, and I still love it! I still do some lab work related to sustainable Ag. It (working in the field of agriculture) was by choice because I wasn't supposed to do agriculture, but I really liked it and that's why I ended up switching and of course, I'm married to a farmer.

#### What is one of the proudest contributions that you have made in Agriculture?

One thing that made me stay longer is teaching students. My students have been getting really good jobs and being successful. Every semester I say this is the best class. That has made me so proud. To see that whatever I'm teaching they are learning and passing it along. Some of them are now extension agents working for the government and in private industry. These are recent students and so many of them are going to graduate school. I think that is something that you can see on a regular basis and, in the past, we did community gardens. Working with the homeless and in the prisons. It just depends on what period in my life. There is something that made me proud. Probably right now it's starting the honeybee program and having the tree orchards is something that has me excited. We have 140-something hives and we are planting fruit trees. So that is something that is going to last for a long time. I hope when I come back in 20 years, they are going to be producing fruit. It depends on what point in my career at Southern University

that has brought me joy. And of course, there is Extension work, every time I meet a person who has come to our workshops, they talk so well about what a great job we do, and not just me. It's a team.

#### What advice do you have for women who want to have a career in Agriculture?

It is a good field! When I started working at Southern there were not too many women. It was a male-dominated program. And throughout these years I have seen a big evolution of more women getting involved in agriculture. There is no reason why not to get involved in agriculture. As I said it's a male-dominated field but not only here, but everywhere else women are the ones doing agriculture. There were countries where women were raising the food so why not here? It's good to see that there are so many women right now in agriculture. So go for it! There's no difference. Whatever advice I can give to other females is to don't try to depend on somebody else. Do the job yourself because sometimes we are left alone. We have to learn what we are doing. Anything related to equipment or working in the field or teaching or something. It's a good feeling for me. That's the reason I switched, having the challenge and producing something. There's nothing more rewarding than seeing those vegetables coming up in the field.

# SNAP-Ed Nutrition Education Program Celebrates National Nutrition Month with Local Schools

The SU Ag Center's SNAP-Ed Nutrition Education Program partnered with schools across East Baton Rouge Parish to commemorate National Nutrition Month, an annual initiative established by the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics held in March. This campaign aims to promote informed food choices and foster healthy eating and physical activity habits among individuals.

The festivities commenced with Capitol Elementary as the SNAP-Ed Nutrition Education Program partnered with the school in the national reading literacy campaign, "Read Across America." East Baton Rouge Nutrition Educator Chrishana Thomas, along with Content Developer/Public Relations Specialist



for SNAP-Ed and Cooperative Extension, Kandace Moss, engaged in the challenge by reading nutrition-themed books to students in kindergarten through 4th-grade.

"Reading literacy is the gateway to knowledge and empowerment for children. Just as nutritious food fuels the body, feeding young minds with books is vital for their growth and development," expressed Thomas. She went on to say that she spearheaded the collaboration between SNAP-Ed and Capitol Elementary to instill nutrition education in young minds while highlighting the importance of reading literacy among elementary students.

Jessica Anderson, Literacy Coach at Capitol Elementary, expressed her enthusiasm for the collaboration, emphasizing the significance of community organizations in enriching students' educational experiences. "Read Across America is not only about promoting and celebrating literacy but also about exposing students to diverse educational opportunities beyond the classroom," stated Anderson.


The National Institute of Science (NIS) is one of the oldest national scientific membership organizations to serve students and staff from Historically Black Colleges and Universities.
